HIGHLIGHTS

New Street Crimes Unit

In early December, the Independence Police Department created a new Street Crime Unit (SCU). This specialized police unit is responsible for proactively targeting high crime hotspots, repeat offenders, disorderly residences, ongoing vagrancy issues, and other crime related community problems.

New Drone Unit

This year we began the process of developing the first Drone (UAS) Unit to help with locating missing persons, traffic control, search warrant executions, tactical situations, criminal surveillance, mapping crime scenes, and traffic accidents sites. The creation of a drone unit is expected to improve emergency response, expedite crime scene investigations and increase citizen safety and officer safety.

No Shave & Jeans Fundraising

From November 2018 through March 2019, IPD raised \$12,285 from employees to donate to various charities and give back to the community.

Crywolf Alarm Reduction Program

The city implemented a mandatory alarm registration program to drastically decreased false alarm calls for the the police and fire departments.


The "Youth Alcohol" grant

This grant provided by MODOT, to pay for salaries during the checks, was increased dramatically. In February, MODOT provided an additional \$35,000. This increased the total funding for 2018 to \$70,000. This one time additional funding allowed for the significant increase in the total numbers of Compliance Checks.

- Fatal crashes dropped 34% from twelve to eight. The Traffic Safety Units issued 26,582 citations. The police department issued 555 parking tickets

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS

2,813 Cases worked by the Criminal Investigations Unit

The CIU worked a total of 13 homicide investigations with a 100% clearance rate.

The average number of cases assigned per detective Jan .1 through Apr. 17 was 54. The average number of cases assigned Apr. 17 through Dec. 31 was 78.

In 2018, officers assigned to the Patrol Division responded to over 61,000 calls for service and completed nearly 16,000 police reports.

There were an average of 19.5 calls for service, per day, per officer. This year, officers began to be dispatched to calls for service based on their specific location rather than their assigned district. This is called "proximity dispatching" and its goal is to reduce response times. Priority Levels for calls for service

RESPONSE TO FORCE INCIDENTS

• There were 156 response to force incidents. (58% sustained minor injurie, 40% were not injured. 2.6% were K9 bites. 0.6% were hospitalized)

- 31 IPD officers sustained injuries during these incidents. Two were major injuries.
- 1.51% of those arrested booked into detention involved a response to force.
