2019 HIGHLIGHTS

STEP Program Replaces DARE

Beginning in the 2019-2020 academic school year, SRO's no longer participated in the DARE program. Instead, a newly developed program, STEP (Students Transitioning Exceptionally Prepared), was implemented. This innovative program was developed by the School Resource Officer Sergeant, Sergeant Shull. All of the SRO's played a major role in getting the program established by producing the specific courses that are now taught in the STEP program. The program not only benefits the police department, but also provides additional services to the Independence School District. Most notably, both organizations enjoy the benefits without adding any additional operating costs to either entity. Terminating the DARE program allowed the SRO Unit to assign both former DARE Officers to schools that previously did not have SRO's assigned to them and could not be filled due to budgetary constraints.




Simple Assault Against LEOs:

The Independence Police Department is proud to announce the start of our police department therapy dog program. This year, we met "Josie," our new police therapy dog. Josie is a two-year old golden retriever/border collie mix who is a trained therapy and PTSD dog. She has been donated to the Independence Police Department by K9's For Freedom & Independence, a non-profit organization that trains and donates dogs to military veterans and first responders.

Our therapy dog's purpose is to help improve the psychological well-being of our employees at the police department. The therapy dog was assigned to our Peer Support Team and resides with one of the team's members. The dog will accompany the assigned officer during his regular tour of duty at work. We are excited for this new addition to our police family and hope Josie can help us all better cope with the various stresses of the job.

Josie is unique is that we believe we are the first police department in the Metro area, possibly even the Midwest to have a therapy dog.



PATROL

In 2019, officers assigned to the *Patrol Division* responded to over 64,000 calls for service and completed around 17,100 police reports. Officers recorded over 16,300 warrant arrests, and almost 20,000 self-initiated arrests. There were an average of 12.85 calls for service, per day, per officer.
