PATROL

In 2018, officers assigned to the *Patrol Division* responded to over 50,000 calls for service and completed nearly 12,200 police reports.

There were an average of 12.09 calls for service, per day, per officer. The cCty entered a state of emergency in March of 2020 due to COVID 19. This led to many changes in the way we were policing. RESPONSE TO FORCE INCIDENTS

- There were 125 response to force incidents.
 (15% sustained minor injuries, 35% were not injured. 2% were admitted to the hospital
- 30 IPD officers sustained injuries during these incidents.
 1 moderate injury and one fatality
- Most common charge related to use of force was Resisting Arrest, 36%, followed by Assault on Officer, 11%
